
The annual general meeting was held on September 2, a new executive was elected, or re-elected as the case may be, as follows:

Bushwalking Gear Hire.

The gear provided is expensive to replace and is hired out at a minimal cost. Therefore it is requested that you the hirer take every precaution and care to return the hired gear in the exact same state as when first hired. You will have to sign a declaration to this effect and provide a \$10.00 deposit. Any damage to equipment will be repared from the deposit and if gear is irretrievably damaged or lost, it will have to be

replaced at cost by you.

Priority will be given to people hiring gear for club trips, over private trips.

MORETON ISLAND 31/7 - 2/8/92

We left on Friday in Jill's car, screeching our way through peak hour traffic, to catch the Scarborough ferry before it departed. Arrived in the nick of time and hurriedly got disorganised to get on the barge. The barge costs \$16.00 return and takes you to Bulwar.

The one and a half hour trip was spent sampling beer in the lounge. The barge was full of drunken four-wheel-drivers, so there were plenty of people to talk to.

Arrived at 9pm and started walking the road (sand track) to North Point. Set up camp in an excellent spot next to the beach at about 10.30pm. We then walked out to the beach and gazed at the stars in the brilliantly clear sky.

Started hiking, at the leisurely time of 9am, with the intention of exploring some of the interior lakes. Walking cross-country was easy through the sparse vegetation and on firm sand. Crossing the inland marshes proved more treacherous, with several people sinking up to their waists in the vegetable muck.

We had lunch at Lake Jabiru and then had a swim in the tea-coloured water. This was to be our drinking water for the rest of the trip. While the others decided to head for the road I took a direct line towards the lighthouse at Cape Moreton.

This took me through some of thickest scrub I have yet encountered in my hiking career. I even had an encounter with a wild pig. We stood staring at each other for a few moments and then started running in opposite directions.

I arrived at the lighthouse at about 2pm and waited for everyone else to turn up. At about four the lighthouse keeper offered to point his shotgun at me if I wasn't off the site by 4.30. I hurriedly packed my gear and headed off down the road. I met Kate and Paul coming up the road, and together we returned to the lighthouse for a quick look.

We slept that night on the beach next to Heath Island. The campsite was rather exposed as it nestled between two marshes.

At the end of the island a local gave us a lift to Combiouro Point. From there we had a leisurely stroll to Bulwar to catch the 1pm ferry.

The whole trip turned out really well with excellent weather and walking. If you plan on sleeping on the island it's a good idea to take plenty of insect repellant.

Mt Maroon - 5th September 1992

Walkers: Janice Porter, Ashlea Troth, Paul Hill, Peter Allen, Robert Dancer.

As usual, I was running a bit late, but met Peter and Janice at the hitching posts only ~5 minutes after the appointed time. We then wandered around to Paul and Ashlea's, where we all loaded into Paul's car for the trip down south. After the obligatory pie (not to mention apple (?) slice) from the Beaudesert Bakery, we eventually made it to the starting-off point for the walk, the site of a now well-and-truly ruined house just inside the National Park boundary of Mt Barney National Park, on the southern slopes of Mt Maroon.

The walk up the hill was uneventful but interesting, with some nice wildflowers and some interesting rock, not to mention steadily improving views of Mt Barney's impressive northern face. After ~250 m of climb, the predominantly eucalypt vegetation gave way to a very open rock-strewn slope. This leads to a small (in parts) rockface, which was easily scrambled up. A short walk/rockhop from there led to the summit.

interesting rock formations, (b) delightful little "hidden" valleys, and (c) outstanding views, to name but a few of its attractions. Unfortunately, due to the burning off which is so prevalent at this time of the year, smoke reduced visibility, but nothing (short of a heavy fog!) could mask the breathtaking views of Mts Barney, Lindsay and the Barney/Ballow massif. Even Mt Warning can be seen poking its distinctive summit over the Lamington Plateau (just).


After an early and leisurly lunch, we started down the main western ridge leading toward Mt May. We then dropped west into the major creek, and rockhopped down towards Paddys Plain. After a while the floor of the creek (on the whole dry, except for a few occaisional stagnant soaks) levels out to form a very flat rock sheet, usually at least 4 m wide. Every so often this sheet has been eroded and undercut, leaving a small (~2 - 4 m) cascade down to another, wider rock sheet. It must be a wonderful sight when in full flow. One particularly large drop (~10 m) reminds me a bit of a small-scale Waragamba Dam, i.e. a concrete gravity dam. The water rushing over and down that would be spectacular. As it happened, however, we only had a dribble!

Presently the relatively steep-sided creek opened up into Paddys Plain. A short easy walk led down to Paddys Gully and an impressive (unmarked) waterfall. I am no geologist, but I think the rock was jointed basalt; whatever its makeup, it is a sheer (smooth!) drop. Again, I am not good at judging heights, but I would have thought it to be a bit over 50m high. We walked around the top of the falls to the eastern side, where there is a convenient tree for rigging the pitch. About half way around, I was cautiously passing a tree (only 1 or 2 metres from the drop) with Peter behind me when I heard a startled cry followed by a scrabbling sound. Thinking "Oh no, Peter's slipped over the edge" I quickly turned around to see him sitting back on the ground looking up. At about the same time I caught a glimpse of a goanna breaking records racing up the tree we were passing!

Paul rigged the pitch from a convenient tree which grows out (sideways) from underneath a boulder, and up. Futhermore, being somewhat afraid of heights, I was reassured by the sturdy width of this tree! The boulder which "sits" on it is probably ~1x2x4 m, and also quite solid. After both Paul and Peter were satisfied with the rig, we abseiled down, Janice first, with Paul directing traffic perched on top of the boulder. Paul came down last, and I snuck away to take some photos from the bottom while the ropes were retrieved and packed. After a water-and-chocolate break we headed off back towards the cars, which were approximately 2km away around the slope. As we got going, Paul came up to me and said quietly, "now that everyone is down safely, I thought you might be interested to know that every time there was weight or a jerk on the rope I could feel the boulder move!". 'Nuff said. I'll be happy to do it again, though!

We arrived back at the car at approximately 6pm, and after a short round of "who-can-blacken-the-others-with-charcoal-most, followed by some cleaning up (I wondered why Ashlea is called Ash.....) we headed back to Beaudesert, where we managed to consume a number of hamburgers, not to mention a certain quantity of ice-cream. An enjoyable day was had by all, and if anyone is considering doing Mt Maroon or the Paddys Plain area, I can recommend it highly! Thanks to Janice for the organisation!
